Background

- Interprofessional education (IPE) is a critical component of a team approach to patient care
- Most medical schools provide IPE content early in the curriculum, often with mixed reception by students
- Hypothesis: medical student perceptions of the value of IPE become more positive over time, i.e., as they progress through training and gain more clinical experience

Methods

- We examined a variety of data sources in a longitudinal fashion, with emphasis on the experience of a single class (Class of 2017) across all four years
- Data sources included:
 - End of course/rotation feedback
 - > Learning environment surveys



Results



M1/M2 nursing students has a positive impact on my learning.


Working on a clinical care team including pharmacists, nurses, medical M3/M4 students, and residents has a positive impact on my learning.

Summary

Strong trend whereby all IPE related data appears to show favorable perceptions over time
